Parish Update

2018 Parish Council meeting dates: 25 January, 15 March, 19 April (Annual Parish Meeting), 17 May (AGM), 28 June, 9 August, 20 September, 1 November and 13 December.

Parish Precept 2018/2019 – the parish council has not increased the precept for the next financial year and remains the same as the previous two years £22,236.

No Cold Calling in the village – as well as Sutton Lane and Main Street, becoming No Cold Calling Zones, The Laurels can be added to this list.

The next areas requested are Norris Avenue and St. Helen's Square. A parishioner will be calling on residents of these two streets asking for their signatures if they agree to their areas becoming No Cold Calling Zones. If your street is interested in becoming a NCCZ please get in touch with the clerk.

Play Park – Year 6 from Barmby Moor CE Primary School, opened the new Captain Mannering play equipment just before Christmas. Thank you to the children for making the event a happy and eventful experience.

Fields in Trust – the PC is in the process of applying to the Fields in Trust to protect the Play Park remaining a green space in perpetuity.

ACV64: Asset of Community Value – The Boot & Slipper Inn has been accepted as an Asset of Community Value. This has been achieved by the hard work of Councillor J. Gregory.

Parking on the grass verges – you will have noticed the terrible conditions of the village greens and grass verges at the moment due to the very wet conditions. Members of the Parish Council ask you take care when driving not to drive on the grass, and also not to park on the green areas.

Various traffic issues in Barmby Moor:

Back Lane junction B1246 – ERYC has been approached asking for a reduction in the speed limit on entering the village from Pocklington. Local residents have expressed concerns on the speed of vehicles using Back Lane for access onto the A1079. The request has been refused because of the gateway treatments on the road (red surfacing) reminding drivers to slow down, as well as the various traffic signs should slow drivers speeds. Members also expressed concerns about school children crossing the road at this end of the village. ERYC advised the children should be encouraged to use the zebra crossing close to Chapel Street.

Flat Lane towards the Playing fields – another request to reduce the speed limit to 20mph in Flat Lane has been rejected as it is a rural no through road and speed limits cannot be enforced by the Police.

Zebra crossing in Main Street – a request to make the crossing more prominent has also been rejected. Problems of drivers refusing to stop for pedestrians is dangerous driving. ERYC believe that “making the crossing more visible would not have prevented driver’s actions for not stopping. Zebra crossings require a little give and take between drivers and pedestrians”.

A1079 junction with B1246 – ERYC consider that this junction has a good road safety record and cannot justify new lighting columns. However they plan to replace the bollard warning signs.

The Parish Council will continue to pressurise ERYC to improve road safety issues in the parish.

Motor cross noise on the Industrial Estate – Environmental Health Officers and the Parish Council are trying to arrange a meeting with the Police and hopefully the landowners to see how to stop the scrambling events on the Industrial Estate. Unfortunately the relevant officer is off ill at the moment so no date arranged as yet. Will keep the parish updated.
